

GENDER AFFIRMING CARE IS A "BIG MONEY-MAKER" FOR HOSPITALS

Several hospitals have been embarrassed and scrambling after footage appeared promoting the financial benefits of performing gender-transition surgeries, while dismissing the ethical concerns raised by medical personnel.

Vanderbilt, UCSF and UCLA are among the hospitals who expect their staff to get onboard with sterilizing and surgically transitioning even minors. Those who refuse to go along with it are considered "problematic."

A video surfaced of Dr. Shayne Taylor of Vanderbilt University Medical Center in 2018 saying these "types of surgeries bring in a lot of money" and later saying that female-to-male bottom surgeries are "huge money makers."



Another video showed Dr. Ellen Clayton of Vanderbilt warning that employees who do not want to participate in transgender treatments "probably shouldn't work at Vanderbilt." She also stated that they should expect their objections will be met with "consequences."

Vanderbilt also boasts an affiliate program which pairs patients with a "Trans Buddy" activist who will sit in on every consultation to monitor staff compliance with pronouns and other "unsafe" behaviors.

Chaya Raichik of *LibsOfTickTok* posted recorded calls made to Boston Children's Hospital and Children's National Hospital, proving they willingly perform hysterectomies on minors. Although hospital spokespeople later claimed the staff was "mistaken," and insisted all trans-surgeries require patients to be 18 and to give informed consent. Interestingly, the entire CNH trans-care website went offline once the recordings were made public.

Evidence is mounting that the trans-movement has little to do with genuine concern for the children whose lives are being permanently altered. Hopefully, public pressure to put an end to it will also.
